

Seminar:

Tahar Haddad and the Family Law in Tunisia

Tahar Haddad (1899-1935) was a modernist Tunisian scholar best known for contributing to female emancipation and trade unionism in his country. His book *Muslim Women in Law and Society* (Imra'atunā fī al-sharī'a wa-al-mujtama'), published in 1930, although very controversial during his time, had a significant influence on the struggle towards female emancipation. Its echoes can be found even in Tunisian Family Law, which made some of Haddad's claims a reality by banning talāq and polygyny, for example. During this seminar, we will look into Haddad's proposals and analyze their impact on family law.
